## INTRODUCTION

## **OUR VALLEY... STRONGER**

Our Valley – the Wenatchee Valley and surrounding communities in Chelan and Douglas counties – stands at a pivotal moment in its history. The 21st century has brought a host of issues that challenge our traditions, core values, quality of life, and communities. These include the impacts of increasing population growth, declining affordability, rising social divisions, and a rapidly changing climate. These next several years are a critical time to ensure this place is a resilient, inclusive, healthy and innovative community for people to live, work, study and play.

In January 2021, Our Valley Our Future / Nuestro Valle Nuestro Futuro launched its "Our Valley, Stronger" community visioning and planning project, leading to this new five-year Action Plan for the years 2022-26. This "whole-of-community" plan was developed by the residents of this region and backed by community partners from the private sector, government institutions, public agencies, nonprofit organizations, and community groups. The project's name was chosen to reflect the belief that if

residents work together, the region can come out of the COVID-19 pandemic in a stronger, more resilient position as it looks to the future.

During the outreach work in 2021, Our Valley Our Future (OVOF) sought answers to these thematic questions:

- Where are we now?
- Where are we going?
- Where do we want to be?
- How do we get there?

To engage with people and to collect input, OVOF interviewed a diverse group of community leaders and influencers, conducted a public survey, held focus groups and panel discussions, and then conducted a follow-up public validation survey.

All told, about 2,000 community members answered questions and provided feedback. Participation cut a wide swath across the community: 67 percent of participants live in Chelan County, and 31 percent live in Douglas County. About 26 percent self-identified as Latino.

What OVOF clearly heard is that community members continue to place a high value on the region's natural environment (open spaces, scenic beauty, wildlife), outdoor recreation opportunities, sense of community and collaboration, cultural diversity, public power assets, farms, medical services, amenities, and low crime rates. Such values not only speak to what residents do not want to see go away in the future, but also provide a kind of yardstick against which to measure proposed future plans.

At the same time, community members perceive the region is changing quickly, leading to new challenges that include the need to smartly adapt to growth; add housing for essential workers and young families; build resiliency in the face of climate change, wildfires and disease; counter inequities magnified by the COVID pandemic; bridge cultural divides; improve educational opportunities; improve community wellness; and prosper in the midst of evolving economic sectors, technologies and systems. If these challenges are not

dealt with, community members fear many of the region's long-treasured, quality-of-life attributes will be lost forever. Said one community leader, "The key is finding a way to preserve our beautiful way of life and also grow."

All of this information, along with hundreds of vision ideas from community

members, was then handed off to six citizen committees ("Action Teams"), which researched, vetted and recommended a series of new action items to the OVOF Board of Directors. Those action items are what make up the bulk of this new five-year Action Plan.

It is clear that there are enormous

opportunities in front of us, not only to meet the challenges of today but also to "futureproof" our community for other challenges coming down the pike – as they inevitably will. As you will read in this Action Plan, the opportunities to create a more prosperous, well planned, inclusive, resilient and sustainable region are almost endless.

## **GLOSSARY OF TERMS**

This Action Plan is organized into six focus areas - broad subject areas that include both new and ongoing action items to help achieve the region's overall vision. Listed with the action items are lead partner organizations who have signed on to help implement them. Each focus area also includes at least one "Game Changer" project, a major initiative that promises to advance our communities in profound and fundamental ways.

Here are the key terms in understanding the plan's contents:

#### **VISION**

A statement of what our residents would like the region to be long-term for a particular focus area. This overarching future direction is meant to articulate a shared community goal and guide actions and implementation efforts for those focus areas.

#### **ACTION ITEMS**

Projects, programs, or activities that support implementation of a focus area's overall vision. The text that follows each action item describes its intent. Note: some action items represent brand new activities, while others have been carried over from the first Action Plan (2017-21) and are still ongoing.

#### **GAME CHANGERS**

Major initiatives that are complex, involve multiple sectors and partners, may take

a long time to complete, but ultimately will "move the needle," significantly in advancing our communities.

#### **LEAD PARTNER**

A nonprofit organization, community group, business or government agency that has accepted responsibility for facilitating and seeing to fruition the implementation of an action item or game changer.

#### **OPPORTUNITY AVAILABLE**

This means the action item is available to a nonprofit organization, community group, business, or government agency interested in taking on the project and seeing it to fruition.

#### **ECONOMY**


Our businesses, entrepreneurship, economic development initiatives, and training programs that help provide jobs and livelihoods that serve as the backbone of a growing economy.



Include such steps as:

- Launch the work in 2022 with a regional housing survey of residents and a housing needs study;
- Hold a Regional Housing Summit aimed at sharing knowledge about best practices, available tools, and innovative solutions, and at developing potential actionable steps that will increase the region's affordable housing inventory;
- Research and recommend a final list of actions that will address the housing shortage;

 Monitor, evaluate and determine which efforts are succeeding and communicate that information to decision-makers and community members.



## REGIONAL WILDFIRE PREVENTION, PREPAREDNESS AND RECOVERY

Making Our Valley more firesafe for current and future generations

#### DESCRIPTION

Form or identify a regional organization responsible for coordinating all stakeholders and identifying funding for the region's wildfire prevention and preparedness efforts.

Include such steps as:

- · Develop a bilingual communication platform and awareness campaign to better inform and prepare residents and visitors before, during and after wildfires to reduce loss associated with catastrophic wildfire-related disasters:
- Encourage and assist property owners to assess and manage their own property to protect homes and structures and private lands;
- · Develop an infrastructure plan to guide recovery efforts;
- · Lobby Congress to update or revise the current Okanogan-Wenatchee National Forest Plan to significantly increase the scale and pace of forest treatments such as mechanical thinning, small diameter harvest and prescribed burning to improve

forest health and reduce the risk for catastrophic wildfires:

- · Study the potential of opening a forest products campus in Chelan County to process timber thinned from the Okanogan-Wenatchee National Forest and to boost the regional economy;
- Study the potential for a forest resilient bond, junior taxing district, or Impact Investing to increase the region's ability to fund forest treatments on public lands.

Recruit and prepare people from underrepresented groups – such as people of color, indigenous people, people with disabilities, students, retirees, people from a lower socioeconomic status, and people who are gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgendered – for leadership positions in the region, all with an end goal of creating a more authentic, inclusive, productive, and harmonious community.

Include such steps as:

- Enlist community leaders in a campaign that recognizes inclusion as a core community value; and that welcomes, encourages and mentors people from underrepresented groups as they seek leadership positions on commissions, councils and boards or seek to participate in and contribute to civic life:
- Offer a leadership program for people from underrepresented groups interested in running for public office or joining a board;
- Conduct learning sessions for community leaders interested in learning how their organizations can better reflect the public they serve and how their organizations can nurture a culture of inclusion on an ongoing basis;

 Encourage local governments to examine whether the institution of voting districts could remove barriers to equal cultural representation.

# **IDEAS FOR THE FUTURE**

**Our Valley Our Future** received other ideas for projects, programs and initiatives from community members. For a variety of reasons, these ideas ultimately were not selected to be featured in this Action Plan but are important concepts that deserve to be listed here for future consideration.

## OUR SHARED **PROSPERITY FOCUS AREA**

Future-Oriented Manufacturing. Attract a manufacturing firm here to build the needs of the future: solar panels, wood turbines, hemp, using bamboo to make things

Economic Incentives. Provide economic incentives to create a wider base of employment beyond the service industry. Offer incentives for companies to move to the valley

Small Business Empowerment. Empower small local business in the face of bigger box stores and restaurant chains

Bilingual Basic Financial Counseling. Provide basic financial counseling in English and Spanish for both individuals and small businesses as a knowledge base

**Increased Local Wages**. Increase wages and close the income gap for a significant portion of our community

Expand the Cannabis Crop. Allow farmers to grow marijuana so there is more diversity in agriculture, not less

**Public Power Community Education.** Conduct a community education campaign about the region's energy resources, including economic development opportunities, what next industries might be coming, and how the region will benefit from those new industries

Community Farmers Markets. Start and then nurture farmers markets in smaller communities where they are not currently present

**Loop Trail Business Opportunities.** Expand business opportunities along the Apple Capital Loop Trail, including restaurants, food trucks and vendors

Wine Trail. Create a wine trail. Start a shuttle service to wineries

Tourism Train. Start a tourism train between the Chelan. Leavenworth and Wenatchee areas

Waterville Historic Preservation. Plan for and restore downtown Waterville buildings as a way to preserve the town's historic characteristics and to attract tourists

Night-Sky Mapping. Promote night-sky mapping and birding on the Waterville Plateau

**Entiat Valley Recreation Facilities.** Improve U.S. Forest Service recreation access and facilities in the Entiat Valley to boost tourism in Entiat

Data Center Recruitment. Recruit data centers as a way to create more living-wage jobs and to increase property tax revenues to support our communities, along with safeguards for local residential ratepayers

### **OUR WELL-PLANNED REGION FOCUS AREA**

Regional Land Use Planning. Start a regional land-use planning organization that includes both counties, all the cities, the Transportation Council, Link Transit, etc., so there is better coordination of development, infrastructure and services around a limited land supply and to ease the housing crisis

Transfer of Development Rights Program. Consider starting a transfer of development rights program, a voluntary, incentive-based, and market-driven approach to preserve land and steer development growth away from rural and resource lands

Major Thoroughfare Beautification. Engage residents about ways to beautify main thoroughfares such as Sunset Highway and Wenatchee Avenue

Tax Remittances for Infrastructure. Seek tax remittances from the state so local governments can build out infrastructure and/or acquire property to incentivize workforce housing

Home Buyers Assistance Program. Provide a home buyers assistance program to local residents of 5 years or more

**'Sell Local' Housing Promotion**. Work with real estate agents on a "sell local" project to retain stock for multi-generational/working folks who cannot afford current home ownership

Incentives for ADUs. Offer subsidies to people who want to develop ADUs on their property. Waive development fees to owners who agree to not use an ADU as a short-term vacation rental for 10 years. Institute a higher tax rate for people buying a second home in the

Upper Valley Sidewalk Improvements. Construct more sidewalks to make Upper Valley communities more walkable



### Urban Area Parks & Greenspaces.

Ensure there are enough parks, green spaces and playgrounds in neighborhoods where apartments and other high-density housing is being built

Highway 2 to Stevens Pass Improvements. improve Highway 2 to the Stevens Pass summit

Downtown Wenatchee Parking Garage. Construct a parking garage in downtown Wenatchee

Leavenworth Parking Garage. Construct a parking garage in Leavenworth

South Wenatchee Bike-Pedestrian **Bridge.** Construct a pedestrian bridge connecting South Wenatchee with the Apple Capital Loop Trail

Wenatchee River Bike-Pedestrian **Crossing.** Build another pedestrian and bicyclist connection across the Wenatchee River

Leavenworth Highway 2 Bypass. Build a bypass for Highway 2 around the town of Leavenworth

**Lake Chelan Ferry**. Start a foot ferry or mosquito fleet to get around Lake

Chelan Rails to Trails. Turn the train tracks to Chelan into a "rails and trails" for bikes only

Multi-Modal Mass Transit. Consider

other forms of mass public transportation that allow tourists and residents to co-exist. Consider a light rail system connecting Wenatchee/East Wenatchee to other communities.

Disaster & Crisis Preparedness Planning. Prepare for the next pandemic and natural disaster with an emergency plan that includes clear directions on who is in charge and what kinds of information in what languages need to be released. Coordinate meetings of emergency responders so they can debrief about the COVID-19 pandemic and determine what to do better next time.

## **OUR SUSTAINABLE ENVIRONMENT FOCUS AREA**

Sustainability Opportunities. Provide more opportunities when it comes to recycling and other ways to reduce waste, residential and community composting, electrification of vehicles and systems, use of LID lights by governments and businesses, and an increase in other renewable energy

Glass Recycling Facility. Open glass recycling plants in the Wenatchee area and Upper Wenatchee Valley

**Recycling Directory.** Create an online, searchable, bilingual directory of solid waste service providers

Renewable Energy Capital. Become the Renewable Energy Capital of the World. Embrace a project that actively moves to sustainable energy use locally. Develop wind power to create jobs and energy for our communities.

Greater Wenatchee Park & Recreation **Authority.** Create a metropolitan park and recreation authority in the Greater Wenatchee Area

Entiat Trails. Construct walking and biking trails along the Entiat and Columbia rivers in the Entiat area

Lake Chelan Trails. Develop more paved trails in the Lake Chelan area

**Recreational Permit System.** Enforce limits on people recreating and parking in the wilderness, parks and forests by instituting a day-pass permitting system for trails in the region. Allow certain days to be "locals only" on the trails so residents can enjoy the surrounding beauty as well and not have to fight the crowds.

**Hut System**. Develop a hut-to-hut trail system connecting the Wenatchee Valley with the Roslyn/Cle Elum area

Bilingual Recreation Signage. Install road signs in English, Spanish and Indigenous languages that direct people to trails, greenspaces, and other outdoor recreational assets

Improved Lake Chelan Access. Provide additional legal places to reach Lake Chelan without trespassing. Develop more parks with lake access in Chelan, Manson and the South Shore.

Native Plants. Plant native plants around the community and in the foothills to outcompete the invasive species and other weeds

### OUR SAFE, HEALTHY SUPPORTED PEOPLE FOCUS AREA

**Public Health Campaign**. Conduct a community campaign that brings about a better understanding of public health

Healthcare Provider Solvency. Keep our health care providers solvent and local if at all possible. Provide better support for hospitals, nursing homes and other facilities.

Improved Medical Facilities. Invest in additional medical facilities in Wenatchee/East Wenatchee to encourage diversification of our medical providers and to promote competition. Start a pediatric therapy center with visiting pediatric specialists.

More Equitable Health Access. Provide health care to all people, regardless of their income or immigration status. Seek out medical advancements that would allow all service providers in the valley to provide care without requiring insurance. Provide more clinics or service outreach.

Poverty Simulation Workshops. Hold a poverty simulation workshop to better understand the elements of poverty and how to address it

**Disabilities Support Groups.** Create a support group for people with disabilities

**Safe Boating**. Provide more safe boating activities on the Columbia and Wenatchee rivers

Small Town Traffic Enforcement. Provide more traffic enforcement, particularly in smaller communities



Latino Community Center. Develop a community center for Latino residents, where people can go to find help and resources for different needs such as employment, schools, doctors, lawyers, and other programs and activities

**Spanish-language Senior Center.**Develop a senior center for Spanish speakers

Native American Visitors Center. Develop and build a Native American center in the Wenatchee Valley Larger 'Make a Difference Day'. Hold a bigger version of Make a Difference Day, perhaps over a week's time, with more community service oriented ideas and groups that youth and young adults would want to be part of

**Culturally Inclusive Events.** Remake events that are traditionally for Anglos so Latinos and other racial and ethnic groups feel more comfortable attending and participating

Latino-Themed Plaza. Create a plaza where Latino community members and other residents can come together to talk, enjoy food, and listen to music

**Inclusive Rodeos.** Promote and expand rodeos, which both Anglos and Latinos attend, as a way to bridge the cultures

Hybrid Virtual/Real Time Meetings. Continue to hold virtual meetings, which allow for less travel and more inclusivity. Hold community training events for people not yet versed with this technology.

Improved Community Calendars.
Communicate about events that draw

residents of various backgrounds and interests together

Support for Local Media. Support local media better as a trusted source of information in the region. Support small communities that want to start their own community news sites.

**Community Story Telling**. Hold a large-scale story telling campaign

**Unification of the Cities.** Take more steps to unify the cites of Wenatchee and East Wenatchee

Governance Reforms. Update our local governance systems to be more effective and more representative. Become "home rule" charter counties, expanding the boards of commissioners to five, non-partisan positions representing and elected by districts.

Proactive Public Leadership. Encourage leadership to be more willing to adapt to change, to take risks and to drive action. Encourage leaders to engage with residents where they are at.
